

Dr. Richard Rabinowitz is one of the leading public historians in the United States, with over forty years of experience in creating new museums, exhibitions, media presentations, outdoor installations, and educational programs that connect our people to their communities, their diverse traditions, and American lives past and present.

As founder and president since 1980 of AMERICAN HISTORY WORKSHOP, Dr. Rabinowitz has led the creative work of scholars, curators, educators, artists, architects, designers, and institutional planners in fashioning over 500 successful and innovative history programs at sites like the New-York Historical Society, the Lower East Side Tenement Museum, and the Constitution Works program at Federal Hall in New York; the Birmingham Civil Rights Institute; the National Underground Railroad Freedom Center in Cincinnati; twenty-six state heritage park projects; and local and regional historical societies in thirty-three states and the District of Columbia.

Dr. William M. Fowler, Jr. has taught courses at Northeastern University dealing with: the History of Boston, Maritime History, and the History of New England. He is the Gay Hart Gaines Distinguished Fellow in American History at Mount Vernon. He also teaches at Mystic Seaport Museum and has lectured at the Smithsonian Institution, the United States Naval War College, and the Sea Education Association. He is a trustee of the Ralph Waldo Emerson Association, The Paul Revere Memorial Association, The Rhode Island Historical Society, and the Old North Church Foundation. He is a member of the Massachusetts State Archives Advisory Commission and an honorary member of the Boston Marine Society, as well as a Consulting Editor to The New England Quarterly. William Fowler is the author of a number of books dealing with American history.

Dr. Joseph G. Garver grew up in Harrisburg, Pennsylvania, and did his undergraduate work at Dickinson College. He has a Ph.D. in history and a master's degree in library science from the University of Pittsburgh. Garver is the reference librarian of the Harvard Map Collection in the Harvard College Library and the editor of the Boston Map Society Newsletter. He has curated exhibits and written extensively on the mapping of New England, including his book *Surveying the Shore: Historic Maps of Coastal Massachusetts, 1600-1930*. He lives in Acton, Massachusetts.

Robert A. Brown, AIA, IIDA, is a Principal with CBT. Mr. Brown received a Bachelor of Architecture from Miami University of Ohio and studied at the Diploma School of the Architectural Association of London. He is a member of the Boston Society of Architects, serving as its President from 2001 to 2002. Mr. Brown serves on Boston Mayor Thomas Menino's Central Artery Competition Taskforce concerning surface use of the Big Dig, and was a member of the Back Bay Architectural Commission from 1983 to 1993. He is spearheading the Boston Society of Architects long-range plan, interior licensing, public relations effort, and public policy initiatives. Mr. Brown joined CBT in 1981. His work includes the design of a broad range of academic, corporate, residential and landmark urban developments, and he is equally a leader in the firm's interiors practice. Mr. Brown has been an instructor, a member of the Thesis Committee, Development Committee, and critic at the Boston Architectural Center over the past 20 years, and has served as a design critic at MIT, Wentworth, and Northeastern.
